Starting school is a new and exciting experience for your child. We want to make this transition as easy as possible for both you and your child.

The children are at the centre of everything we do and our aim is to give them the best opportunities that we possibly can. We see Slaley First School as a community made up of the children, staff and parents. We all have an important contribution to make and we value the support of parents and families.

Our latest OFSTED inspection in 2015 described us as 'A very caring and inclusive school where all the pupils are cherished and enabled to access all the school has to offer. Good relations are fostered well and there are no signs of discrimination; staff work hard to ensure that all groups of pupils, no matter how small, do as well as they can.' Our high standards are a credit to the hard work of the children, staff and parental support.

About our School

Pupils benefit from our rural first school organisation as they are taught in mixed age classes. School staff plan and work closely together and offer teaching expertise and strengths across different year groups. Teaching assistants provide support in both key stages and where necessary, assist with individual and small group intervention. Small year groups and changes to pupil numbers sometimes require adjustments to overall class organisation.



The classes are currently arranged as follows:-

EYFS Unit - taught by: Miss Roz McCall

This Unit includes Nursery (from the age of three) and Reception pupils in the morning. Reception pupils continue their education in the afternoon, working in both the EYFS Unit and the Key Stage 1 Class. Recently, we have increased our nursery provision from 15 to 30 hours, enabling our youngest pupils to access afternoon sessions.

Year 1/2 – Key Stage 1, taught by: Mrs Rachel O'Neill and Mrs Julie Stevenson.

Reception then move into Year 1 which is taught alongside Year 2 in the Key Stage 1 Class.

Years 3/4 -Key Stage 2, taught by: Mrs. Debbie Brett, Ms Sue Roff & Mrs Julie Stevenson

Years 3 and 4, together with Years 5 and 6, are referred to as 'Key Stage 2'. Years 5 and 6 are taught at one of the Hexham Partnership middle schools.

The Curriculum

At Slaley First School your child is taught the National Primary Curriculum which provides pupils with an introduction to the essential knowledge that they need to be educated citizens. It helps them engender an appreciation of creativity and achievement.



Through the Early Years curriculum, children are encouraged to develop active, enquiring minds, together with skills such as observing, questioning, experimenting, recording and concentrating. We also emphasise the development of communication and social skills in order to promote an easy integration into school life.

Children in Years one to four follow the National Curriculum, which includes the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Science, and the foundation subjects of History, Geography, D.T., P.E., Music, Art and design, MfL (KS2), Computing and Citizenship. Teaching of Religious Education is also required at all key stages.



Much of your child's work in school will be practical, investigative and problem solving related to real situations. However, each National Curriculum area has several essential skills that children will need to develop in order to progress. At Slaley First School these skills will be specifically taught as part of a continuous and planned programme of work in each Key Stage.

Special Educational Needs & Disabilities

Some children in school are identified as having a particular Special Educational Need or Disability. These children receive extra help from staff according to their level of need. In this way we are able to help them make the best possible progress, to the best of our ability and available resources. The school has a Special Needs Coordinator (SENCo) who liaises with the parents of children who have specific needs.

School Worship

A daily act of collective worship is provided for all children, some acts of worship are held in class and these are special times for children to reflect and explore their thoughts and feelings.



We are fortunate that we are supported by St Mary's Church in Slaley Village. If you wish to withdraw your child from either worship or religious education please contact the head teacher, Mrs D Brett.

We are most Proud of

Our links with the local community and taking part in local events.

Our School Council. The council meet and discuss items decided upon by their classmates or requested by staff. Issues are discussed, debated and voted on. The council has a small budget to finance projects agreed upon.

Our sportsmanship. All our children are motivated to improve their performance in all areas and are very committed to doing this. It's great when we win but we know how to lose gracefully, congratulate our opponents and try harder next time.

Our children. Wherever we go, people praise the behaviour, manners and attitude of our children. They are a pleasure to take out.

Our ethos. This is what makes us different; this is what makes us special. Visitors often comment on how they feel comfortable and at home when they enter our school.

Our outdoor space. We are so lucky to have lots of space for children to play and learn outside. The children enjoy our wooden play equipment and the field gets a lot of use. We have playtime buddies to make sure that no-one is ever lonely at playtime.



Our school meals. These are prepared and cooked in our own kitchen. Our desire is to encourage children to eat healthily and experience new foods by offering them fresh, home cooked meals. We have enclosed a sample menu for you.

Contacting the School

Sickness absence

Please telephone the school by 9:30 on the first morning of absence.

Parents Evenings

We hold parents evenings and information events throughout the year. We will tell you about how your child has settled and the progress that they are making towards their personal targets.

Informal Chat

If you have a concern, please feel free to speak with the teacher or teaching assistant about your child. You will see them when you drop off and pick up your child. If the teacher is unable to speak with you at that time you can arrange an appointment by contacting the school office.

School Office

Mrs Wilson is in the school office and can deal with most issues, however she does work part time and therefore there may be times when she is unable to take your call.

Supporting your child at home

As your child will be getting used to reading, writing and maths at school, it really helps if you could encourage them to practise these skills at home as well.

Reading

Reading at home is the most important thing that you can do to help your child succeed. Aim to spend about 10 to 15 minutes per day sharing a book with your child. If this is too long then break it down into shorter sessions.In Early Years and Key Stage 1, your child will be bringing a book home to share with you. They should be able to talk about the pictures in the book and tell the story in their own words. It is helpful for young children to read the same book more than once, but if you are worried about this please speak to your child's teacher.The books provided will be appropriate to your child's reading abilities, remember everyone will learn at a slightly different pace.



<u>Writing</u>



At Slaley, we encourage the use of cursive letter formation from the start, unless a child finds it particularly difficult and their progress is hindered. Wherever possible please encourage your child to write at home.

Number Work

Mathematics consists of a number of areas including, counting, recognising numbers, adding, taking away, 2-D and 3-D shape, measuring in simple ways, time and money. All these skills you can reinforce at home, in a practical, fun way. For instance, making reference to these in your child's day to day experiences will help immensely. Children feel much happier when learning, using their own experiences: a trip to the shops, looking at the number on houses, finding shapes around the house, reading the clock on the wall, sorting their toys are just a few of these examples. As your child gets older, times tables are really important and should be practised at home as regularly as possible.

Frequently Asked Questions

Will my child have homework?

Slaley First School values parental involvement and has drawn up homework activities which encourage parents to share with their children what they are learning in the curriculum at school.

It is expected that children will read with their parents daily and other homework is planned depending on the needs of individual children and curriculum topic themes.

At Key Stage 1 & 2, homework is set on a Wednesday and is due in on a Monday. In Class 2, the children record their homework in a homework diary. This helps parents to know exactly what the children are being asked to do and helps the children to remember what was said to them in class. These diaries are also handed in on a Monday and provide an additional home school communication tool.

Are the children allowed a healthy snack during the school day?

Yes, we have a healthy snack every morning; this is usually a piece of fruit.

Also, your child is eligible for free milk until the term in which they turn five. When your child is five, you will be given the option to pay for them to continue to receive milk.

We also encourage children to bring a bottle of water (no juice) to school with them each day. It is important for children to be hydrated as this has been shown to help their learning.

Are there any after school clubs?

Yes, we have several: these include football, tennis, netball, multi-skills, craft, choir, etc. These can vary, so please check the website for up-to-date information.

Do the children go on any visits?

Yes, the children may have an educational visit or a visiting speaker in, most terms, which supports their learning and relates to their current topic.

Can I help the school?

In many ways! You could come and hear children read, help in the classroom with art work, help at fund-raising events by supporting our FoSS (Friends of Slaley First School)

School Uniform

At Slaley First School there is a standard uniform for children which we encourage them to wear.

Girls

- Grey/black: trousers/shorts/skirt/pinafore
- Yellow polo shirt
- Royal blue sweatshirt/cardigan
- White, Blue, Black or Grey socks or tights
- A blue & white or yellow & white gingham dress may be worn in the summer
- Plain black school shoes or boots (no sandals or trainers)

Boys

- Grey/black trousers/shorts
- Yellow polo shirt
- Royal blue sweatshirt
- Plain black school shoes or boots (no trainers)

P.E. Kit

- Royal blue shorts
- Yellow, round neck t-shirt (no buttons or fastenings)
- Royal blue sweatshirt & track-suit bottoms (for outdoor P.E. & swimming)
- Socks & Trainers (rather than plimsolls, as they do not afford enough support)
- Drawstring P.E. bag (clearly named)

All uniform, PE kits, bags, coats, shoes and wellies need to be clearly labelled with the child's name.

Jewellery and Hairstyles

The wearing of jewellery, especially earrings, is <u>not</u> allowed because of the possible danger to the wearer and to other pupils. NCC has a policy of not allowing earrings to be worn during PE, for reasons of safety (this includes swimming). The school accepts no responsibility for the safekeeping or removal of any jewellery or watches. Children should have long hair tied back at all times during the school day and hair should not be dyed or styled in extreme fashions, including rats tails and tramlines, during term time.
