

What's it all about?

"The Summer Reading Challenge is about reading for the pleasure of reading."

The Summer Reading Challenge takes place over the summer holidays in libraries throughout England, Scotland and Wales.

Developed by charity The Reading Agency, along with the UK public library network, it is now in its 20th year and is the UK's biggest annual reading promotion for primary aged children.


761,758

Each year there's a new theme to keep the Summer Reading Challenge fresh and exciting.

For 2018 the theme is **MISCHIEF MAKERS**, celebrating the 80th anniversary of the much-loved comic Beano.

Mischief Makers will celebrate adventure, friendship, reading and fun and is a must for all children who want to live in the moment and be themselves.

How it works:

The Summer Reading Challenge encourages children and families into their local libraries and inspires them to read for pleasure by combining free access to books with fun social activities and a creative online element.




Throughout the Summer Reading Challenge, library staff and teenage and adult volunteers support children, helping them to discover new authors and explore a wide range of different types of books.



It's easy to take part:

- Children sign up at their local library from Saturday 14 July*
- They receive a Mischief Makers collector poster to get them started
- They borrow and read at least SIX books during the summer, collecting special stickers and incentives along the way
- They can read any library book they choose story books, fact books, joke books, audio books - they all count
- They receive a certificate and/or medal when they finish



^{*}Regional variations do apply so check with your library to find out when Mischief Makers will start and end locally.

What are the benefits?

"Reading widely...opens up a treasure-house of wonder and joy for curious young minds." - National Curriculum for English 2014 Key Stages 1 and 2

"Children who love reading will read more and, over time, choose literature which is more demanding and suitably stretching.

It creates a virtuous circle: as the amount a child reads increases, their reading attainment improves, which in turn encourages them to read more.

How your school can benefit:

- The Summer Reading Challenge is intrinsically inclusive and can contribute to the achievement of all your pupils, including those with special educational needs, disadvantaged pupils and the most able
- It enhances and supports your school's reading policy and your mission for all children to read widely and often
- It keeps your pupils reading over the summer and ready for their return to school in the autumn
- It allows children to become more independent in their reading
- It supports the successful transition between year groups and key stages





"My child used to struggle with reading and the challenge came at a time when he was just starting to click with reading before he started Year Two.

I think the challenge gave him the confidence to read for pleasure on his own as well as with us and the idea of the certificate and medal really spurred him on.


Promoting the Summer Reading Challenge in your school

Promoting the Summer Reading Challenge through schools is one of the most effective ways of spreading the word in the run up to the summer holidays.

- Tell parents! Use the template in your newsletters, class blog or on your website and send family leaflets home in book bags (available May 2018)
- Use the Mischief Makers promotional poster throughout your school in the weeks leading up to the summer holidays
- Tell children about the Summer Reading Challenge website where they can recommend books to others, take part in competitions and play games: summerreadingchallenge.org.uk
- Use the Mischief Makers themed assembly presentation (available May 2018) and invite your local library staff in to tell children what will be happening at their library this summer
- Use the Book Review Bookmarks to encourage children to share their favourite books with their friends (available May 2018)
- Choose books from the Mischief Makers collection to share with your class
- Celebrate after the summer! Encourage children to bring in their certificates/ medals, hold a special assembly, put photos of your completers in your school newsletter, send your stories and photos to:
